Policy statement

Policy statement We provide care for happy and healthy children through preventing cross infection of viruses and bacterial infections.

Procedures for children who are sick or infectious

- If children appear unwell during the day have a temperature, sickness, diarrhoea or pains, particularly in the head or stomach Parents will be contacted to collect their child.
- The child's temperature is taken using a forehead thermometer strip, kept in the first aid box.
- If a Child has a temperature of 38'C parents will be asked to collect their child if parents are unavailable then emergency contacts listed in the child's registration forms will be contacted.
- A child must not have had a temperature for 24 hours before returning to preschool.
- In extreme cases of emergency, the child should be taken to the nearest hospital and the parent informed.
- Parents are asked to take their child to the doctor before returning them to Happy Adventures Preschool.
- Admittance to children will be refused if they have a temperature, sickness and diarrhoea or a contagious infection or disease or if child appears too unwell to participate in activities as they normally would.
- Where a child has been sent home from preschool, they must not return for 24 hours after their symptoms have cleared.
- Where children have been prescribed antibiotics, parents are asked to keep them at home for 24 hours from the first dose before returning to Happy Adventures Preschool.
- Parents are asked to keep children with sickness and diarrhoea away from preschool until they are free of symptoms for 48 hours.
- Happy Adventures Preschool has a list of excludable diseases and current exclusion times which is given to parents after registering their children at the preschool.
- Parents must keep their child at home if they have recently had Calpol, until they are well enough to return
 to preschool Calpol will not be administered at preschool, only medication prescribed by a doctor which
 is clearly labelled with the Childs name, DOB and prescription and expiry date.

Reporting of 'notifiable diseases'

- If a child or adult is diagnosed as suffering from a notifiable disease under the Health Protection (Notification) Regulations 2010, the GP will report this to the Health Protection Agency.
- When Happy Adventures becomes aware, or is formally informed of the notifiable disease, the manager will inform Ofsted and act on any advice given by the Health Protection Agency.
